
GREAT RINGSTEAD NEWS AND VIEWS

Ringstead Parish Council -From the Chair- Bill Jacob

The Parish Council meet normally monthly, on the second Monday at 7pm, except in August. However, the next meeting will be on 7th April. Members of the public are welcome to attend and to raise matters. Agendas and minutes are posted on the website and the parish noticeboards.

Budget

In December the Council approved its budget for 2025/6 to enable it to undertake its responsibilities and retained the parish's precept for a second year at £19,000. Following the Borough Council's introduction of a second-home premium in April 2025, the Ringstead Tax Band D charge for the Parish Council will fall from £110-40 to £96-74, a saving of about 17%.



Neighbourhood Plan

The Referendum for the Neighbourhood Plan was held on 13th

February. There was an excellent turn out, with 41% of eligible voters voting. The result was 77 votes in favour and 21 against. The Plan now becomes part of the Borough Council's Planning Policy. (see separate article).

Highways

The Council monitors highway matters every month, particularly potholes and clearance of 'grups' to drain surface water off roads.

Bus Service

Following a request from a member of the public, the Council investigated the possibility of Ringstead being included in the coastal bus service. The narrowness of the unclassified roads into the village precludes this. However, attention was drawn to the West Norfolk Community Transport Projects' Dial-A-Bus service.

Playing Field

The Playing Field is inspected by a member of the Council weekly. The annual Independent Inspection report was received in December, which required no actions. It was agreed to experiment with a different mowing regime leaving part of the eastern edge of the field uncut to encourage wildlife and to see what wildflowers may grow.

Planning

The Council commented on five planning applications December to March.

Fireworks and Bonfires

Concerns were raised by members of the public about fireworks alarming horses and pets, and bonfires causing smoke hazards. People planning to let off fireworks should warn neighbours over a wide area

so that horses and pets can be managed and check the wind direction before lighting a bonfire, so the smoke doesn't cause a nuisance.

Footpaths

The long-awaited registration of public footpaths in the village will be resolved by the Planning Inspectorate following a Public Hearing on 22^{nd} and 23^{rd} July at Thornham Village Hall, when objections to two proposed Ringstead footpaths will be heard.

Litter Pick

The Annual Litter Pick will be on Saturday 29th March, meeting at 10am at the Village Hall. Equipment is provided, with coffee and biscuits afterwards. All are welcome.

Ringstead Neighbourhood Plan

The Referendum for the Neighbourhood Plan took place on Thursday 13th February and the result was announced on Friday 14th February,

Ninety-nine votes were cast, representing a 41.25% turn out, which is very good for a local authority referendum.

77.8% of those who voted said the Plan should be accepted. The Plan has therefore been adopted by the Borough Council.

The Plan contains a range of locally distinctive policies relating to planning matters including housing (mix and tenures), design, green infrastructure, community infrastructure, the historic environment and active travel. It also includes an allocation of land for social housing development comprising up to 6 dwellings.

From now on, full development plan weight should be given to the Neighbourhood Plan's policies in making decisions about planning applications within the Parish.

Our thanks to all those (including our various consultants), who have worked over the past five years or so to achieve the Plan, and special thanks to Bernard Birch who contributed the photographs of the village for the Plan.

Churchwardens report Spring 2025

I am pleased to report that the current schedule of work in the old churchyard is complete making the area more accessible, although one still needs to take care. The previous attempt at re-wilding having not been managed successfully resulted in an overgrown area hazardous to walk in. Numerous self-seeded saplings have now been removed, the ant and mole hills have been flattened and the soil spread around to level the ground. It looks a bit of a mess at the moment, but soon the plants will grow back through. The area will be strimmed, rolled and eventually mown.

The "bug hotel" constructed in the corner already has residents.

I hope that all who visit this churchyard will find peace and calm and enjoy the view. Maybe we can site a new seat or bench here.





Work on the church guttering and down pipes will begin soon. When this is completed the damp problem inside can be addressed.

Joan Marchbank passed away in the Queen Elizabeth Hospital on Tuesday 11th March. She had been ill for some time.

She and her husband, Peter, moved to Ringstead in July 1996, having had a holiday home here since 1989. Although born in Cambridge, she studied French and Russian at St Anne's College, Oxford, and thereafter spent thirty-five years teaching in girls' Grammar Schools in Blackheath, Basingstoke, Manchester and Altrincham. The happiest time of her life, though, was here in Norfolk, where she played her cello in orchestras in King's Lynn and Ely and chamber music with like-minded ladies. Often the playing would be punctuated by frequent gales of laughter.

For many years, she was a member of Hunstanton Golf Club, where she was also a keen bridge player. She was especially proud of a teaspoon that she once won in a competition. She was, though, essentially a serious and caring person who spent several years as an adviser for the Citizens' Advice Bureau and she also helped at the Food Bank in Hunstanton when it was first established.

Her greatest gifts for many were her friendship, her cheerfulness and her generosity and the messages of condolence that the family have received testify to that. She will be much missed as a wife, a mother and a friend. It is hoped that a concert in her memory can be arranged in King's Lynn in October.

The Need for Deer Control on Farmland and Gardens

Muntjac deer may be small, but their growing numbers are causing major problems for farmers and gardeners. Whether you admire them or see them as a pest, controlling their population is essential.

By managing muntjac responsibly, we protect our countryside, support local agriculture, and enjoy a fantastic source of natural, healthy meat. Next time you see venison on the menu, consider it a step toward a better-balanced ecosystem.

Replacing Other Meats with Venison

Venison is a fantastic alternative to beef, lamb, or pork because it's lean, high in protein, and rich in flavour. Here's how you can substitute it:

- Beef: Swap minced venison in burgers, meatballs, or chili. It has a slightly richer taste but works perfectly in these dishes.
- Lamb: Use venison in stews or curries where lamb is called for. Its unique flavour makes a great substitute.
- Pork: Try venison sausages or replace pork in stir-fries and fajitas for a leaner option.

Simple Venison Steak Recipe

2 venison steaks (about 6 oz each)

1 tbsp olive oil or butter

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 tsp fresh rosemary or thyme, chopped

Salt and pepper to taste

1 tbsp balsamic vinegar (optional, for extra flavour)

Instructions:

- 1. Prepare the steaks: Pat the venison dry with paper towels and season both sides with salt, pepper, and chopped herbs.
- 2. Heat the pan: In a heavy skillet over medium-high heat, add olive oil or butter. Once hot, add the minced garlic.
- 3. Sear the steaks: Cook the venison for about 3–4 minutes per side for medium-rare (internal temperature of 54-58°C). Avoid overcooking, as venison is lean and can become tough.
- 4. Rest and serve: Remove from the pan, let rest for 5 minutes, then slice and serve with your choice of accompaniments.


That is where Peace Haven Paws can help. I have left my previous job, and I am feeling happy that from the loss of Barney, something positive is happening.
