RINGSTEAD PARISH COUNCIL - Chairperson, Bill Jacob

As the elected representatives of the village, Councillors are always keen to hear people's views. Council meetings are open to the public, and people are encouraged to come to meetings. The agenda provides time for people attending to speak and raise concerns. Agendas and minutes of meetings are displayed on the noticeboards by the Shop and on the Bus Shelter on Holme Road, as well as on the Parish Council's website at

If you have a concern or question do raise it with a Councillor.

The past three months have seen a key stage in the development of Ringstead's Neighbourhood Development Plan. However, the Council has also been dealing with routine matters.

The Council has received £9,912-65 from the Community Infrastructure Levy payable to the Borough Council for the development in Chapel Lane, which it was agreed to ring fence for capital expenditure for the benefit of the village.

We have approved our budget for 2024-5 for £19,000, funded by a precept from the Borough Council included in The Council Tax paid by residents. This covers the costs of employing a Clerk, which we are required to do, managing the Council's business, including maintaining open spaces and the Playing Field equipment, and providing road signs.

We have agreed to deposit the Council's archives, including minute books from its inception in 1895 in Norfolk Record Office in County Hall at Norwich, but Ringstead History Group has scanned the minutes, so a copy will continue to be accessible in the village.

The draft review of public and permissive footpaths in the village, undertaken in 2015, for the County Council's Definitive Map of walks, has recently been published for consultation. As an objection has been made it has been referred to the Planning Inspectorate.

We monitor road conditions in the village, and recently the County Highways Department have cleared the 'grups' (drainage channels) on the roads, which has helped to reduce surface water on roads. The Sam2 signs, monitoring speeding, have also been serviced. We are very grateful to Justin Aldis for looking after them.

Five planning applications from the village to the Borough Council have been commented on.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be on Monday 13th May at 6.30 in the Village Hall. Reports on the past year's activities and from all village organisations are made, and any questions or concerns may be raised. Do come along.

VILLAGE HALL REDECORATION PROJECT Jane Barnett

In August 2023 Jane Barnett, Village Hall Trustee and Parish Councillor applied for a Borough Council Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Grant and was successful in obtaining a grant to redecorate the interior and exterior of the Village Hall.

Quotes were obtained from 3 local decorators and the contract was awarded to James Everitt Painting & Decorating Home Improvements who began work on the internal work over the Christmas period. The hall reopened in Mid-January with the internal works completed, we are just awaiting new blinds which are due to be installed by the end of March. And as soon as it stops raining long enough the exterior work will begin!

RINGSTEAD HISTORY GROUP - Kate Bulmer

Kate from Ringstead History Group takes another look at the Parish Council Minute Book 1911 to 1955. This time

How many new houses does Ringstead need?

Under the heading "The Better Housing Scheme" the Parish Council Minute Book records a meeting in April 1919 to discuss the need for new housing in the village. By the Housing Act of that year local authorities became responsible for developing new housing and providing rented accommodation where it was needed by working people. Ringstead PC being quick to comply, decided that 6 new cottages were necessary, and 3 possible sites were considered.

The need for more housing continued to be regularly discussed throughout the 1920s and '30s. In May 1927 the Parish Council were asked by Docking Rural District Council if there was a need for "working class dwellings at a rental of 5shillings and 6pence (27½p) per week, plus rates". The reply was that "there is a demandfor such dwellings...but...the rent mentioned was too high for working men to pay". There certainly was need, in January 1933, 8 persons applied for the tenancy of one of the 6 new Council Houses to be built, in January 1935 there were 25 applications for six new council houses, in 1950, 14 applications for one property.

I think that the first 6 to be built were those on Holme Road. These were followed in the 1920's and 1930's by 6 more on Holme Road, 6 on Foundry Lane (listed as Council House East Lane in the 1939 Register). The Peddars Way (North) houses built in the late 1930's, the first tenants moving in just before the start of World War 2. Those in Gold's Pightle (or Golders as it is in the PC minute book) being built in the early 1950's.

"EDW: TOOKE MADE ME 1676"

There were two churches in Ringstead in 1676. From St Andrew's church register we know that Thomas Fysh was the Rector and R Granger the Churchwarden. There were 5 baptisms, one marriage and 4 burials. In St Peter's, Timothy Swift was the Rector, Robert Creed the churchwarden. There were 2 marriages, one baptism and one burial.

This is the inscription on the church bell in St Andrew's pictured here being lowered down the tower recently, the start of a restoration journey.

The wooden headstock and frame that holds the bell is to be replaced. A new clapper and chime rope to be fitted to allow the bell to be sounded without further damage to the bell. Work is also being carried out on the clock.

It is hoped this will be complete by Garden Sunday – watch this space.

RINGSTEAD NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN - Bill Jacob

The Plan, after some four years' work, is now reaching its final stages.

The Parish Council are very grateful for all the work that people have put into its development, not least the people who have delivered leaflets and provided tea and coffee for the three public consultations and have come to the consultations and completed survey forms. This has helped to ensure that people who live in, and have an interest in, the village and are concerned for its wellbeing for the future have had opportunities to express their views at every stage of the Plan's development.

The 'Regulation 14' Consultation for the Plan took place between 22nd January and 3rd March. A summary of the draft Plan, for which there have been two previous public consultations, was distributed to every residential property in the village. Notices were sent to eighty 'statutory stakeholders' and a list of 'Frequently Asked Questions' along with a Survey Form were distributed to every residential property with a link to the full draft Plan on the Parish Council website.

About twenty people attended the Consultation in the Village Hall on Saturday 10th February. Fourteen statutory stakeholders made comments and twenty-six people completed the Regulation 14 survey. Respondents included residents, second homeowners, landowners, business owners and employees.

The draft Plan will now be amended in the light of the comments received, and will be received and, all being well, approved at the Parish Council meeting on 15 April.

After approval at the Parish Council the plan will be submitted to the Borough Council who will undertake a further public consultation.

After the Borough Council's public consultation there will be a further opportunity for revision and the plan will then be submitted, along with details of the process for developing the Plan and all the responses received during the various consultation, to an Independent Examiner. If the plan is approved it will then be put to a referendum of all registered voters in Ringstead hopefully before the end of the year.

BASIC COOKIE RECIPE FROM SUE


Ingredients

- 225g(8oz) caster sugar
- 110g(10oz) plain flour
- 225g(8oz)butter
- Flavouring of your choice
- eg spices, dried fruit, nuts, fruit zest, the choice is yours.

Method

- Preheat oven to 170c(325f) gas mark 3.
- Cream butter until soft.
- Add sugar and beat until light and fluffy.
- Sift in flour, bring the mixture together to form a dough,
- Add flavour of choice,
- Using your hands, roll the dough into walnut sized balls,
- Place slightly apart on a baking tray (no need to grease or line),
- Flatten slightly with the back or a damp fork.
- Bake for13-15 minutes or until lightly golden brown and slightly firm on top.
- Carefully transfer to a wire rack to cool.















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
