### RINGSTEAD PARISH COUNCIL - Chairperson, Bill Jacob

The Parish Council met in July and September and undertook its routine business of monitoring the Council's finances, maintenance of the Playing Field, highway maintenance, and commenting on planning applications received by the Borough Council.

On finance, the Council agreed to increase the annual grant to the Village Hall Committee from £600 to £800. On the Playing Field the Council continues to seek a contractor to undertake maintenance on some long-standing equipment. The Council is seeking to identify the 'grups' which drain surface water off roads, so they can be cleared by the Highway Authority to avoid flooding. The possibility of providing a notice board on the Holme Road bus shelter is being explored.

#### **Footpaths**

Subsequent to the submission in 2016 for registration of two additional permissive footpaths in the village, the Council has recently been informed that progress is being made on the submission and we should shortly be informed of the outcome of the submission.

#### **Planning applications**

The Council has commented on five planning applications since June, including an extension at 48 Docking Road, infill of a claypit at 17 Chapel Lane, building works at 34 Docking Road, an extension at 62 Docking Road, and a member of the public raised concerns about the progress of the development in Chapel Lane.

The Parish Council meets on the second Monday in the month at 7pm in the Village Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend, and ten minutes are allowed for members of the public to raise any issues they wish.

### **RINGSTEAD NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN - NEXT STEPS**

The draft Neighbourhood Plan was submitted for comments to the Borough Council in March 2023 and received a positive response but, following a recent policy change, Natural England required a strategic environmental assessment of the site of the proposed social housing on Peddars Way North. To fund the assessment to be undertaken by AECOM, a grant was required from Locality, the government agency set up to support neighbourhood planning, which we applied for. However, Locality did not receive its grant from the government to enable it to fund such grants until August, when we were awarded a grant.

We have now met with a Principal Environmental Planner from AECOM and the strategic environmental assessment of the site, which is a largely paper exercise, is underway, and should be completed by the end of the year. All being well, we will be able to hold a further public consultation on the final draft of the Plan early next year and revise it in the light of any further comments for submission to the Borough Council. They will undertake further consultation, in the light of which it could be further revised, before being submitted to an independent examiner. In the light of the Examiner's comments, it can be submitted to a referendum of voters in the village. All being well we may achieve the Plan by the end of 2024.

#### **RINGSTEAD ALLOTMENT CHARITY GRANTS**

Ringstead Allotment Charity (Charity Number 1103778) is a small charity run for the benefit of residents of the village, and to assist in providing projects for the wider benefit of the village community. It is endowed with the Chalk Pit in the Downs and also Ringstead Common on Burnham Road, which is leased to Court Yard Farm, the rent from which provides the Charity's annual income.

Recently the Trustees have made individual grants to pensioners resident in the village and towards the cost of the Gateway and 30 mile per hour signs on the roads into the village which makes the roads safer for pedestrians.

The trustees are keen to receive applications for grants from residents in the village including people who may need assistance with housing costs, heating costs, primary, secondary, or higher education, or training, childcare costs or long-term medical conditions or bereavement issues.

If you, or somebody you know, falls into any of these categories, or if you are affected by the current cost of living increases, please contact us <u>in order to</u> be considered for an award. Please include your full name, address, the reasons for your application, and any additional details you may feel will help us in reaching a decision. All applications will be treated in confidence. Closing date for applications for this year is 13 November 2023.

## \*\*\* ROAD CLOSURE \*\*\*

NORFOLK COUNTY COUNCIL proposes to make a Temporary Traffic Regulation Order (WTRO4249) affecting the C89 Sedgeford Road from 150m north of its junction with C103 Ringstead Road for 60m northwards in the PARISH OF RINGSTEAD to facilitate kerb installation works.

The road will be temporarily closed (except for access) between 07:00 and 18:00 from 23rd to 27th October 2023 (Weekdays Only) for the duration of the works expected to be about 5 days within the period.

Alternative route is via: C89 Sedgeford Road, C93 Docking Road/Ringstead Road, C93A Thornham Road, B1454 Docking Road, C89 Ringstead Road/Sedgeford Road.

We continue to be grateful to our excellent retired clergy who are officiating during this period of vacancy between permanent clergy. #### A BASIC ALL IN ONE SPONGE RECIPE

A prize-winning recipe from Ringstead's Coronation Bake-Off

#### Ingredients

- 6oz Self Raising flour, sieved
- 6oz cake/baking margarine (at room temperature)
- 6oz brown castor sugar
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 3 tablespoons milk
- Flavour of choice e.g., vanilla/almond essence /coffee/cocoa powder (substitute for an equal amount of flour)

#### Method

- Place all ingredients in a bowl and beat together enough to make a smooth mixture (Do not over beat)
- Divide mixture and put in two greased and floured 7inch round tins
- Bake on the top shelf @170/180degC in a fan oven for approximately 20 mins or until a skewer comes out clean
- Cool on wire rack
- Fill and decorate to your choice

#### RINGSTEAD AND WORLD WAR 2: THE WELCOME HOME COMMITTEE - Bill Jacob

As Remembrance Sunday approaches a little notebook and bundle of letter in the Parish Council archives shows how gratitude was expressed to the forty-four people who served in the armed forces and support services during World War 2.

As demobilisation was a slow process, lasting from September 1945 until March 1947, a great event was inappropriate. Instead, a Welcome Home Committee began raising money to give everyone who had served, or the families of those killed, £5 (about 2 weeks' wages).

The Committee with John Young, as chair, Mrs Jacob as secretary, Mrs High, the Head Teacher of Ringstead School, as treasurer, and seven others, all women of course, mostly wives of farm workers. The target was £215. Everyone knew those for whom they were raising funds. They were their neighbours' husbands, sons and daughters. Mrs High and Mrs Jacob had taught most of them at school. Fundraising began in June 1945 with an appeal for donations. The better-off gave between £1 and £10; the less well-off between 2s 6d and 10s. [1s=5p, 2d-2.5p]-There was a house-to house collection, and collections at the pubs. The Crown collecting £1 3s 3d the Compasses, (now the Gin trap), 16s 6d. Fundraising was urgent, for people began returning in September.

In July 1945 there was a Whist Drive, prizes were 2s Savings Stamps and a 5s Voucher for groceries, and an auction: £6 4s was raised. Later that month Stanhoe Concert Party gave a concert in the village hall (then with a stage). Between 70 and 100 people crowded in: tickets were 2s 6d, 2s, and 1s 6d. A bus was hired, for £2, to bring people from other villages. Early in September another Whist Drive, raised £13 11s 0½d. Later in the month a Whist Drive and Dance, raised £14 3s 0½d, including £2 9s for bus fares, the band being paid £3-3s. Whist Drives and Dances became the major money-raising events, with six between November 1945 and December 1946: tickets were 2s 6d each. There was usually a raffle – in November 1946 of a parcel of groceries, raising £1 11s, and an auction of a cushion cover, raising 12s. Cakes were sold, bought from Mr Wagg, the Docking baker, or Dougie Smith, the Ringstead baker, when he got back from the War in February 1946 at 1d or ½d each. Prizes included vouchers for 5s, given by shopkeepers – the Thornham grocer, the Westgate Library and Guises, greengrocers in Hunstanton and a Sedgeford tobacconist. Snettisham Women's Institute's Choir's concert In November 1945 proved less popular than Stanhoe Concert Party, even with a bus provided, only making £5 6s 1d.

Children's Christmas presents were in short supply after the War, so in the autumn of 1945 a new venture began - making dolls. In August dolls faces were bought from Greenwoods of Ilford, with patterns for making dolls, and filling and hair. People provided their own wool or material. Dolls were sold at 4s 6d each which raised £6 0s 3d.

All this effort, with no doubt much enjoyment, raised £216 14s 2d. Between September 1945 and March 1947 Mrs High sent £5 each to forty-one people who had served in the forces and returned, and the families of the three men who were killed on active service. Twenty-six, being well brought up, wrote letters of thanks to Mrs High and the Committee.

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
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
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
